Nationalism, Religion and Violence in SE Europe

Summary of course

The International Hellenic University (www.ihu.gr), in partnership with Charles University of Prague, Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO) of Cyprus and with the support of the **LSEE** - Research on **South Eastern Europe** is offering a 2-week intensive Summer School for Students of Political Science, History, Anthropology, Sociology, International Relations, International Law, Journalism and other related disciplines. The course can be taken by both undergraduates and graduate students.

The general theme of the summer school is **Nationalism, Religion and Violence in SE Europe**. A key goal of the summer school is to contribute in a substantial way to the study of violence and to catalyse the growth of the study of violence as a field. Furthermore, participants will have the opportunity to forge valuable connections with one another and with senior scholars working on various aspects of violence.

Structure of the Programme

General structure

The summer school will focus on five different but interconnected themes:

- Genocide, Ethnic Cleansing and Mass Atrocities
- Political Violence: Legacies and Debates
- Religion and politics: Islam, Judaism and Christianity between tolerance and conflict
- National Self-Imagining in the Era of Globalisation
- Institutional accommodation of nationalism, religion and political violence

Course Credits

A certificate of attendance will be provided, at the end of the programme to all participants. Students/Graduates will obtain 4 ECTS credits for completing the course. Those that will have delivered an oral presentation (for example, the presentation of their research project) on a topic of their choice (guided by the summer school instructors) will receive up to 6 ECTS credits. Since degree requirements vary among universities, students/graduates are advised to ensure, preferably in advance, that their college or university will recognise such certification and award the suggested credits.
