

Suicidology and mental health doctoral study programme, third Bologna cycle

COURSE STRUCTURE of the study programme

The study programme consists of the following components:

- compulsory courses,
- elective courses,
- seminar,
- individual research work,
- doctoral dissertation.

Upon enrolment in the first year, the student selects a supervisor in accordance with their research interests, who provides guidance throughout the study process and in the preparation of the doctoral dissertation.

The doctoral dissertation must represent a significant and original scientific research contribution in the field of suicidology and mental health.

The procedure for the registration of the doctoral dissertation topic and its defence is regulated in detail by the [Rules on the preparation and defence of the doctoral dissertation at the University of Primorska](#).

To complete the programme, the student must fulfil all study requirements defined by the programme and prepare and successfully defend a doctoral dissertation in the field of suicidology or mental health.

Prior to the dissertation being evaluated by the faculty senate, the candidate must have published (or have accepted for publication) two scientific articles related to their dissertation in international scientific literature indexed in the SCI or SSCI databases. At least one of these articles must be an original scientific article, and in both cases the candidate must be listed as the first or lead author.

The content and structure of the study programme are explained in greater detail in the following section.

Legend:

ECTS credits (ECTS) = credit points awarded under the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS). The credit system facilitates student mobility and the mutual recognition of completed academic requirements.

ECTS credits represent an average estimate of the time required to complete a course and include both organized forms of instruction (lectures, seminars, seminar and laboratory exercises, fieldwork, practical training, etc.) and the student's independent work (exam preparation and other course-related obligations, etc.). One (1) ECTS credit corresponds to 25 to 30 hours of study workload. Credits are awarded upon the successful completion of the requirements for an individual course.
